Lenten Reflection

Everyone who sees me laughs at me [...].
Come quickly to my aid. Ah, you have
answered me!
(Psalm 21: 8, 20, 22)

There was a time when I was not interested
in the psalms. I thought they could have
been replaced by a beautiful modern song
that was more in tune with the times. Then,
a teacher opened me up to understanding
these prayers. He gave us some keys to
better understand them. One of the keys is
to identify four elements: the initial
situation, the final situation, the
transformations along the way and the
motivations for the transformations. Here,
the psalmist becomes aware of the situation:
he hears mockery, insults and complains
about his fate. At the end of the psalm, God
answers him and the psalmist acclaims him.
What happened between the beginning and
the end? He remembers that God is his
strength and he calls on him for help. This is
the reason for stepping back from his
problem, trusting God and acknowledging
his presence. Why was the psalmist saved?
Because of his unshakable faith. This
approach makes me see and understand the
psalms in a different light. Like a poem or a
song, they express what I feel and allow me
to better understand the meaning of life.

*Lord, you sang the psalms with your people.
You still pray them with us. Help me to
appreciate them for their true value. Amen.*
